NOTE: MI 310 is a required course for the MDiv program. Participation in one of the intercultural trips is required.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Intercultural/Experiential Learning will engage your head, your heart and your hands around intercultural learning trips to reflect on hosts' understanding of their context and the mission of the Church in that context. The course provides preexperience orientation in self-awareness, cultural proficiency/humility and anti-racism, intercultural communication and intergroup dialogue, a theology of short-term mission engagement, and spiritual practices for mission. After the trips, students will reflect on their experiences both individually and communally, discover new ways to apply this experience in their life, vocation, and theology, and explore personal, cultural, missiological, and theological strategies for leading others in intercultural experiences.

CLASS OBJECTIVES:

- A. Understand foundational concepts in intercultural work: the culture concept, ethnocentricity, cultural proficiency, systemic racism, white privilege, intercultural communication, and intercultural conflict;
- B. Develop a more complex understanding of cultural differences, especially around issues of race, and how God's mission intersects issues of race, racial bias and white supremacy;
- C. Grow in competency, confidence and skill around 6 key learning outcomes/areas: curiosity, self-awareness, appreciative knowledge, application, integration and pedagogy/learning how to learn
- D. Develop an understanding of the relationship between context and mission;
- E. Develop a theology of short-term mission and a missiological understanding of the role of a missionary;
- F. Be exposed to and develop spiritual practices drawn from the experiences of the global church.
- G. Reflect on how to lead a short-term mission trip.
