COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course focuses on moral leadership--the visioning, communicating, and catalyzing of a diverse community to work toward transcendent goals that contribute to the common good— as a key element of pastoral leadership. As such, it will start with a discussion of pastoral leadership identity and the invitation to reflect upon the moral purpose of human flourishing within Christian ministry. We will spend time sketching and sharing our moral compasses, clarifying our values and priorities, engaging our moral imaginations, and learning the skills of professional pastoral integrity, narrative leadership, conflict engagement, leader-care, and catalytic change-making necessary for ourselves and our community members to bring our visions to life.

CLASS OBJECTIVES

- Students will be able to define moral pastoral leadership as a concept and how it fits into the fields of social ethics and pastoral/practical theological method
- Students will identify the particular moral-pastoral values that spring from their life context and judgement
- Students will reflectively develop a philosophy and plan-of-action template for how to take steps to address a moral concern of theirs
- Students will gain an understanding of how psychological factors around identity, possibility, and responsibility affect how we think of leadership and morality
- Students will learn to think, communicate, and engage with deeper ethical nuance and articulacy
